Program Highlights

- Programs may be modified to suit the specific needs of any group.
- Picnic areas, and accessibility information are identified by symbols located within each respective site section.

What You Need to Know

- Programs are available year-round (unless otherwise indicated), by advance booking only.
- Due to the popularity of our programs, we recommend reservations be made a minimum of one month prior to the preferred date of arrival.
- Groups larger than 10 people will be divided into small groups to allow for easier visitor flow and accommodate small spaces and activities.
- School Program Ratios: All sites except the Children's Museum
 - 1 free adult for every 5 students (JK/SK)
 - 1 free adult for every 8 students (Grades 1-3)
 - 1 free adult for every 10 students (Grade 4+)
 - All EAs are free and not included in the above ratios.
 - Any additional adults will be charged the adult group rate.
- A minimum of five days notice is required to make any changes to a booking. All groups will be charged on the day of arrival for their numbers confirmed in advance or day-of numbers, whichever are greater.
- Program rates are subject to change.
- There is a minimum group charge for 10 participants for all bookings.
- Please encourage your group members to dress for the weather.
- Bus parking is available free of charge at most sites.

Dundurn Castle was the mid-19th century home of Sir Allan Napier MacNab, a prominent lawyer, Entrepreneur, military officer and politician whose influence shape the growth of both Hamilton and Canada. From serving in the War of 1812 and the Rebellion of 1837 to building the railway and holding the position of Joint Premier of the Province of Canada, MacNab was witness to many key events in Canada's Pre-Confederation history. Dundurn Castle, a magnificent mansion surrounded by a picturesque landscape and garden, was home to the MacNab family and their household staff and is restored to a time when MacNab was at the height of his influence and the estate bustled with activity. Dundurn Castle offers visitors a unique opportunity to study culture, society, history and politics in 19th century Canada. Programs at Dundurn Castle can be combined with those offered at The Hamilton Military Museum for a full day visit.

Visiting Capacity: Dundurn Castle has a visiting capacity of up to 60 people per booking. If combining your visit with those offered at The Hamilton Military Museum the museums can accommodate up to 100 people per booking.

***Booking Information:** For programs which contain food elements – ingredients commonly found in historic recipes include milk, eggs, butter and flour. For many recipes staff can make accommodations for gluten and dairy allergies if noted at the time of booking.

FIND FIN

While in Montreal, Sir Allan MacNab bought two poodles for his daughters Sophia and Minnie which they named Fin and Finette. In 1848, their beloved Fin went missing! Eager to find him, the MacNabs advertised in The Daily Spectator, offering a reward for his safe return. In this program students will use inquiry and problem-solving skills to search some of Dundurn Castle's rooms to find Fin. While participating in various hands-on activities, students will learn about and create patterns, sort objects into categories, play with historic toys, and practice their mathematical skills. Finish the program by meeting Fin himself!

WHOSE JOB IS IT ANYWAY*

In 1846, Dundurn Castle's butler Wellington accompanied Sir Allan MacNab on a trip to Montreal. In Wellington's absence, the staff found themselves with additional work to do. Using Dundurn Castle's household as an example, students will participate in hands-on activities, taking on roles in the household hierarchy. While exploring the museum on an interactive tour, students will use objects, historic images, and games to recognize and appreciate the roles and responsibilities of domestic staff in

mid-19th century Ontario. Under the guidance of cook demonstrators, students will prepare a recipe in the historic kitchen and will eat what they have prepared.

VICTORIAN CHRISTMAS

Experience the sights and sounds of a Victorian Christmas at beautiful Dundurn Castle and compare 19th century holiday traditions with your own and those of other communities in Canada today. From the ornate Drawing Room to the household staff's

GROWING IN HAMILTON*

In 19th century Canada, children were encouraged to explore the wonders of gardening. In 1846, Sir Allan's daughters Sophia and Minnie MacNab had their own little plot within the Kitchen Garden. Led by interpretive staff, students will engage with hands-on activities to learn about the importance of plants, soil, and composting. They will combine their knowledge of the garden with their experience harvesting produce and crafting a delicious seasonal recipe in the historic kitchen. A short tour of Dundurn Castle will frame the ideas discussed in the garden and kitchen and how it relates to students lives today.

CULTIVATING THE PAST

Guided by interpretive staff, students will explore the garden with a sensory-based tour designed to spark curiosity and wonder. Hands-on seasonal activities will engage their observation and inquiry skills, and assist with students developing a deeper understanding of the crucial connections between people, plants, and the environment.

GUIDED TOUR

Dundurn Castle, a grand Italianate-style villa, was the home of Allan MacNab, one of Canada's first Premiers. On a guided tour, students will gain perspective on the life of the MacNab family and

their household staff. Students will also explore the rich history of the property including the War of 1812. Burlington Heights, where Dundurn now stands, was the location of a large British military post from 1813 to 1815. During the military occupation, the landscape was drastically altered. Some of these elements were later incorporated into MacNab's home and can be seen during the tour.

Burlington Heights, where Dundurn Castle stands today, was occupied by the British military from 1813 to 1815. Housed in Battery Lodge, The Hamilton Military Museum provides a unique opportunity to study the social history of the military in Canada. The museum features exhibits focused on historical figures and artifacts related to the War of 1812 and 1837 Rebellion. Interactive and engaging programs have been designed to address specific expectations in various strands and topics in Social Studies, and History curricula. Programs can be combined with those offered at Dundurn Castle for a full day visit.

Visiting Capacity: The Hamilton Military Museum has a visiting capacity of 45 people per booking. If combining your visit with those offered at Dundurn Castle the museums can accommodate up to 100 people per booking

MILITARY CHRISTMAS

Christmas in the military was very different from traditional celebrations at home. This program allows students to learn about holiday celebrations of the past while exploring the experiences of soldiers stationed overseas during the holidays, and that of their family members who remained at home. Students will have the opportunity to dress up like soldiers and play with traditional 19th century games and toys. Students will use the inquiry process to identify and sort gifts that soldiers would have received in a First World War hamper, and in modern packages sent to soldiers overseas today.

BOOTCAMP FOR BEGINNERS

Do your students have what it takes to be a British soldier? During the War of 1812, Burlington Heights (where the museum is currently located) was an important centre of defense, supply, and refuge for the British Army. Thousands of soldiers called this place their home. While living here, a soldier's daily life consisted of discipline, drill, and the unwavering ability to follow orders. This program allows students to experience life as a soldier by performing hands-on activities related to the War of 1812.

WE REMEMBER: CAMOUFLAGE AND COURAGE

From a time before camouflage to the present, soldiering has been an important part of our history.

As the technology used in warfare has evolved, the ways we remember those who lost their lives has changed as well. From the Upper Canada Preserved Medal after the War of 1812 to grand parades and ceremonies, remembering the fallen is an important aspect of our society. Students will learn why we recognize the sacrifices of those who dedicated their lives to Canada while dressing in period uniforms, participating in hands-on activities and constructing a take-home creation focusing on the symbols of Remembrance.

The Hamilton Museum of Steam & Technology, is located on the site of the 1859 Hamilton Waterworks complex. This National Historic Site is recognized as an engineering landmark. Today, the museum preserves two massive steam-powered beam engines that pumped water in Hamilton from 1859 to 1910. The museum is a unique learning environment where students can see real-life applications of concepts including simple machines, engineering, water systems, chemistry, and social history.

Visiting Capacity: The Hamilton Museum of Steam & Technology has a visiting capacity of up to 50 people per booking.

Booking Information: All programs require participants to wear closed toe shoes and require short walks outdoors between buildings. Please come dressed appropriately.

PUMPHOUSE DISCOVERY

Discover the roles and responsibilities of the people who operated the Hamilton Waterworks, and how the community worked together to deliver clean water to the City of Hamilton. In this program, students learn about the people who lived and worked at the site through a picture book written from the perspective of the Chief Engineer's youngest son. Students will try various hands on activities that connect to the story, like shovelling coal, oiling the engines, and playing croquet. The program concludes with a visit to the historic Pumphouse, where they will see the real locations featured in the story.

SIMPLE MACHINES, BIG PROBLEMS

In 1859, engineers used powerful simple machines to build the structures and mechanisms of the Hamilton Waterworks. This hands-on program challenges students to use six simple machines to solve problems faced by these engineers – including moving heavy objects with levers, lifting materials up with pulleys, and building arches with a wedge.

Students will then see these simple machines in action through a tour of the Pumphouse.

RADICAL REACTIONS (FORMERLY "SOLID, LIQUID, GAS")

The effect of changing states of matter was essential to the operation of the steam-powered Hamilton Waterworks. Through hands on science experiments, including "Oobleck" and super-absorbent polymers, students will identify the different properties of matter and the difference between chemical and

physical changes. By observing the power of steam in action, students will learn how changing states of matter can be used to produce energy and movement.

BRIDGING THE GAP

Since ancient times, engineers have designed structures to withstand the forces of nature all over the world. The original Hamilton Waterworks has supported the weight of two 70-ton steam engines since 1859! In this program, students will learn about the techniques that help engineers build strong and stable structures. Students will then work in groups to build bridges that can withstand different types of load. A guided tour of the historic Pumphouse will show students real-life examples of these engineering principles.

Grade Levels: Three (3); Five (5)

POWERFUL PULLEYS AND GREAT GEARS

Pulleys and gears are amazing machines! In this program, students will investigate these mechanisms by working in groups to assemble a "crab" winch, just like the ones they will see on their tour of the steam engines at the museum. The winch uses pulleys and gears to lift heavy loads, showing how simple machines can be combined to create complex systems. During their visit, students will discover other simple machines that put the steam engines into motion, and the many uses of pulleys and gears.

DISCOVERING DIVERSITY

The construction of the Hamilton Waterworks in 1859, and the resulting industrial boom, brought new opportunities for immigrants from all over the world. Unfortunately, not all newcomers were treated equally by the 1910 Canadian Immigration Act.

In this program, students will learn how historical requirements for citizenship affected people with diverse abilities, cultures, and backgrounds. By examining a suitcase of artifacts and using the historical inquiry process, students will work in groups to develop a narrative about a fictional individual coming to Canada in 1910. They will identify the push and pull factors that may have influenced their characters' decision to immigrate. Using primary source documents, students will then decide whether their characters would have been granted citizenship, or if discriminatory policies may have prevented them from immigrating. The program includes a tour of the museum where students will learn about the immigrants who built the Hamilton Waterworks and the working conditions they faced.

WATER SYSTEMS IN ACTION

In 1859, Hamilton's growing need for clean water was met by the construction of the city's first municipal Waterworks. In this program, students explore the systems that allow us to have clean running water, and how people access water in different parts of the world. Students will simulate the processes at

Hamilton's water treatment plant by building water filters, testing water samples, and assembling a simple "Waterloo" water pump. The program includes a guided tour of the historic Waterworks, where we will discuss the importance of clean water and how water distribution systems have changed over time.

One of the first homes built in Stoney Creek; Gage House was the residence and farmland belonging to James and Mary Gage, where they lived with their 10 children from 1796 to 1835. The War of 1812 had a direct impact on the family when American soldiers occupied their property, and the Battle of Stoney Creek was fought nearby in the early morning of June 6, 1813. British forces, supported by Canadian militia and Indigenous allies, secured a victory that helped prevent American control of Upper Canada. In 1899, Sara Calder, granddaughter of James and Mary Gage and first president of the Women's Wentworth Historical Society, led the purchase and preservation of the homestead and built the Battlefield Monument located on the property to commemorate peace between the two nations. In 2014 the installation of the Eagles Among Us artwork recognizes the diverse Indigenous communities connected to the land now known as Hamilton.

Visiting Capacity: Battlefield House Museum & Park has a visiting capacity of up to 50 people per booking.

HOME IS WHERE THE HEARTH IS

Explore holiday traditions at Battlefield House Museum as students discover how many modern indoor and outdoor winter activities trace their roots to celebrations from more than 200 years ago. Through engaging, hands-on experiences in one of Ontario's oldest historic homes, students will analyze and evaluate daily life in early-19th-century Canada and compare it with their own lives today. Activities both inside the house and outdoors on the surrounding land encourage students to investigate winter pastimes, examine traditions across diverse groups and time periods, and gain a deeper understanding of the Gage family's customs while experiencing winter life in an early-19th-century household.

Grade Levels: Kindergarten; Two (2); Three (3);

Subjects: Social Studies

SETTLING IN SALT FLEET

The Gage family settled in Saltfleet Township (Stoney Creek) in the 1790s during a period of increased immigration to Upper Canada. James and Mary Gage cleared and farmed the land with their ten children, shaping early community life. Through hands-on activities connected to the Gage family's daily tasks such as weaving, planting and getting dressed, students explore how life in the early 19th century compares to today and how families like the Gages influenced modern living.

BATTLE ON OUR DOORSTEP!

On June 5, 1813, during the War of 1812, about 3,500 American troops occupied the Gage family farm and surrounding land. In the early hours of June 6, 700 British soldiers launched a surprise nighttime attack, forcing the Americans to withdraw and stopping their advance into Upper Canada. Through hands-on activities, such as uniform dress-up, musket demonstrations, and battlefield medicine, students will explore and analyze the hardships and realities

of the War of 1812 and the challenges faced by the soldiers, militia and civilians of the time. Included in this program is participation in a one of a kind boardgame where everyone will work as a team to capture American generals and artillery similar to the historical events that took place on site.

SARA CALDER AND THE ART OF BATTLEFIELD PARK

Sara Calder was an accomplished artist and a co-founder of the Women's Art Association of

Hamilton. She was also the founder of the Women's Wentworth Historical Society and the driving force behind the efforts to preserve the Gage homestead and construct the Battlefield Monument. Students will explore and find inspiration in the public art and heritage in Battlefield Park for a sketching activity while learning about post-Confederation Canada and the women who created Battlefield House Museum & Park. Included in this program are discussions about the public art on site, themes and influences of design and learning about their histories. Students will use charcoal pencils in a sketching activity in the museum and the surrounding park (weather permitting). The activity will feature heavy emphasis on shape and form, texture and value.

Whitehern is an outstanding example of a mid-19th century urban estate. Originally owned by a wealthy industrialist, Dr. Calvin McQuesten, the house today reflects all three generations of the McQuesten family. It contains original artifacts and showcases stories from the Victorian, Edwardian and Interwar periods. The house is restored to 1939, when the Honorable Thomas B. McQuesten was at the height of his influence as Minister of Highways and had opened Canada's first modern highway, the Queen Elizabeth Way. Surrounding the home, a walled, ornamental garden provides greenspace for heritage leisure activities. This National Historic Site provides a unique opportunity to explore the changing nature of family life, culture, health, politics and domestic technology in Hamilton. Interactive and engaging programs have been designed to address the Ontario Curriculum in a unique learning environment.

Visiting Capacity: Whitehern Historic House & Garden has a visiting capacity of up to 50 people per booking.

HOME FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Through an interactive tour, students will identify community celebrations that reflect their own heritage and will be encouraged to compare and contrast their own experiences with those of the McQuestens. Students will create a holiday decoration to take home based on a Christmas Storybook belonging to the youngest McQuesten, Margaret Edna.

VOTE FOR TOM

Thomas McQuesten was born in 1882 and eventually rose to become one of Ontario's greatest contributors to municipal works. In this program, students will tour the McQuesten home and learn about the three-tiered system of government in Canada. Inside the Stables, students will participate in a mock vote and explore the history of voting in Canada. The trip includes a visit to City Hall where students will have an opportunity

Fieldcote Memorial Park & Museum is a cultural heritage centre for the Ancaster area with an emphasis on the collection, preservation and exhibition of local history, the promotion of fine arts, and the celebration of natural heritage through beautifully landscaped gardens and walking trails. Griffin House stands today as a testament to the determination of Enerals Griffin, an African-American born in Virginia in 1790, who journeyed to Southern Ontario and established his family farm in the beautiful Dundas Valley. For more than 150 years, their descendants lived and worked on the beautiful farm and were members of the Ancaster community. Visit this well-preserved early 19th century farm cabin that displays the solid, simple architecture once so common in Upper Canada. Explore the history of Enerals Griffin and other early black settlers. Interactive programs have been designed to address Specific Expectations in various strands and topics in Social Studies, History and Geography curricula.

Booking Information: Griffin House is closed to the public while undergoing a restoration project. Programs outlined below are available for **OUTREACH ONLY**.

THE STORY OF ENERALS GRIFFIN

Participants will explore the unique story of Enerals Griffin as he moves from a life of former enslavement in Virginia to build a new life for his family in Southern Ontario. Through a combination of an illustrated storybook, activities, and guided discussions, participants will learn about the Griffin family's experience in an environment framed by racism, the challenges of farming in the 1800's, and the positive impact one person can make to a community. Using the Griffin's story as a guide, participants will reflect on the past through a lens of empathy while employing critical thinking to understand their own role as active citizens.

Grade Levels: One (1); Two (2); Three (3)

FREEDOM SEEKERS

This program introduces students to the history of Black enslavement in Canada and looks at slavery's colonial origins, its history in practice, and the post emancipation era in Canada. Following the activity portion of the program, these concepts are connected to specific historical contexts through a presentation followed by a collaborative group discussion.

The museum is in Gage Park, the former orchard of the Gage Family, and is a wonderful location for school visits because it offers indoor and outdoor experiences. Schools can enjoy a full day visit, especially in warmer months with a visit to the museum and a visit to the playgrounds and water play features of the park.

Learning experiences at the Hamilton Children's Museum are designed to support a wide range of learners. Students can explore a newly redesigned interactive space allowing little ones to explore the many environments of Hamilton. As well as two self-reflective Seeker Spaces that provide opportunities for individual or small-group discovery, as well as a private fenced backyard used for seasonal outdoor programming.

Our programs are designed to foster hands-on, multidisciplinary learning that connects with curriculum expectations across subject areas. Through critical thinking, inquiry-based activities, and sensory-rich experiences, students are encouraged to explore, question, and make meaningful connections.

Working in small groups, students will apply their learning by designing and building a 3D tabletop model of a park. Groups will share and explore each other's designs, asking questions and discussing design choices in a collaborative, creative, and inquiry-based experience.

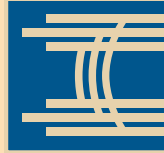
